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WVXX JOINS ST. JUDE IN NATIONWIDE HISPANIC RADIONTHON TO FIGHT CHILDHOOD CANCER OCT. 9-10

At the age of 2, Grace began to suffer from constant fever and stopped walking because of pain in her legs and hips. Results of an MRI revealed that Grace had a seven-inch tumor in her chest. She was diagnosed with neuroblastoma, a common solid tumor of early childhood, and then referred to St. Jude where doctors successfully removed the tumor that threatened her life. Today, Grace has completed her treatment and comes back to St. Jude every four months for checkups.
